My relationship with Prison Fellowship started in 2006. During a very dark period in my life through challenges at work, I was invited to the Prayer Breakfast in Washington. It was an incredible trip where I met Trust and have been some amazing people.

Ever since I graduated as a social worker in 1995, I have always appreciated the books of Charles Colson. While staying at the Hilton in Washington in January 2006, I found myself in the elevator with Charles Colson and his wife. I took the chance Kenneth has been a to thank him for his writing. In classic Colson style, he immediately deflected the focus from himself and said 'I'm iust trying to do what the Lord has called me to do.' He invited me to a Prison Fellowship seminar the following day.

Looking back, the seminar probably changed my life. I had never heard somebody with a clearer vision for how the gospel could transform society. He

stood up and said, 'ideas have consequences and America is reaping the consequences of a society that thinks it can survive without God and his laws.' Later in 2006 l joined Bethany Christian working in Christian work ever since. I am now the Programme Manager for Safe Families in Scotland.

Nearly 17 years later I could never have imagined taking over from Kenneth Mackenzie as Chair of Prison Fellowship Scotland. fantastic servant to PFS providing areat leadership and vision for over 20 years.

It is an honour to be asked to take over as Chair of this great organisation and I hope and pray I can do as good a job as Kenneth has done for so many vears.

I believe that Prison Fellowship can have a huge impact in bringing the good news of the

gospel to Scottish jails. As a Board we are passionate about supporting John and the PFS staff as they engage with SPS, work with churches and recruit and support volunteers who are the lifeblood of the work we do.

Help me."



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
"I would just like to say thanks again for your letters and your thoughtful words and prayers, it means a lot to me."

Letter Writing

In the middle of 2021, when I joined PFS, I had the privilege of taking over running the Letter Writing programme, 'A Time to Write'. This project had begun a few months earlier as a way of helping to alleviate the loneliness and isolation that so many in prison were experiencing during the height of

One man speaks frequently of wanting to live in a small cottage in the countryside. His desire keeps coming back to me as it is so simple. Whether they voice a hope for renewed contact with children, or that they will be able to have a flat when they are released, their openness through hastily scribbled words is wonderful. As I read the letters, it has helped me to see the person as God sees them. with all their nuances and

complexities, but also ultimately, as people loved abundantly. This helps to break down any negative preconceptions you may have about people in prison.

As PFS move through 2022 we are in the process of expanding our letter writing programme to more prisons across Scotland.

With this growth, we will have an increased need for volunteers. We would love to recruit 30 new letter writers over the next year to join our programme; we are particularly in need of male letter writers, so if vou would like to commit to writing a letter once a month to someone in prison, please email me at letter.writing@ pfscotland.org to find out more!

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Openings & Opportunities

Projects Manager **David York** reflects on his work in helping get new Prison Fellowship and Sycamore groups up and running.

A few weeks ago I was invited by the Chaplain of HMP Kilmarnock to speak at the weekly services he is running in the prison. There were about 25 men across three different aroups and it was areat being able to share my testimony and our plans for getting a regular PF group running in the next few months. Although it's a normal part of my job to help get these PF aroups running in prisons around Scotland this group at Kilmarnock is especially exciting for me as it was In HMP Kilmarnock that I first made a decision to follow Christ – and to now be helping to give other men this opportunity is really special.

But we are also excited by new opportunities in other prisons around Scotland. By the end of

the summer we hope to have groups running for both men and women in HMYOI Polmont and also be actively working to get the Perth group restarted after Covid. With existing PF groups running most weeks in Inverness, Castle Huntly, Shotts and Barlinnie we will soon be in more than half of Scottish Prisons aiving men and women a place to explore faith and learn more about all that Christ has done for them. We have also been partnering with Prison Alpha to run an Alpha group in Barlinnie where a group of men are discovering every week more about God's love. Sycamore is also growing;

we have regular groups in Edinburgh, Low Moss and Castle Huntly and are in

discussion with another 5 prisons about getting groups running. Although the Sycamore Tree course is based around the topic of restorative justice we also get to talk about other important themes.

In a recent course up at Castle Huntly one of the men taking part said it was the first time he had ever really thought about the subject of forgiveness and about how he could forgive himself for the mistakes he has made. It is a huge privilege to lead these discussions. Please look out for an opportunity to receive training as a Sycamore facilitator and help grow this work.
